## Skid Awarded **Wound Medal** In Air Battle

Now comes word from General MacArthur's headquarters in Australia that First Lieutenant Arnold (Skid) Johnson, daring fighter flier of the Army Air Forces, has been awarded the Order of the Purple Heart for being wounded in action, and stands to get the Distinguished

Sorvice Cross besides.
Today his father, Teaneck Fireman Nels Johnson of 572 Kenwood man reis Johnson it 22 kenwood Place, Teaneck, said that reports coming from Australia and New Guines are being received by Mrs. Johnson with a little concern. "The crezy flying of our boy," said Johnson, "is just driving Mrs. John-

son crazy. We hear that once he came back to his base his plane riddled with 35 machine gun bullets and that he pilod out of his plane none the worse for it.

Johnson's award of the Purple Heart is believed to be the first in this war to any man from Bergen County. It is believed he was cited for wounds received in the Coral Sea engagement.

Week-end reports brought Johnson's total of Zeros downed to ten.
They credited him with at least two and perhaps three planes last

Two weeks ago today Johnson found himself with three Jap planes on the tail of his Flying Fortress, and then from cloud banks as ambush points daried out twice to knock out two of the planes near Rabaul in New Guinea.

He joined the Army Air Forces 24 years ago to learn to fly.
