**"BULLDOG" HERE ON
100,000-MILE TRIP**

**Dr. Percival in Famous Car
Has All-day Battle With
Snowdrifts.**

**COMPLETES 41,600 MILES OF TRIP
FULL OF ACTION AND ADVENTURE**

With a total distance of 41,600 miles travelled around the borders of the United States and into every state of the union, to say nothing of 1,500 miles in Mexico and a thousand miles north in the Arctic Circle and into Dawson, Dr. Charles G. Percival, editor of Health Magazine of New York city, who is touring the world in the famous Abbott-Detroit "Bull Dog," arrived in Buffalo late last night after battling with the deep snow drifts between this city and Rochester all day. Dr. Percival and the Abbott is bound for Chicago and will leave the city early this morning for the Windy City by way of Canada. He was met outside the city by President E. J. Hussey of the Co-Operative Motor company and a score of friends in several automobiles and escorted into town, where Dr. Percival and his companion, George D. Brown, were thawed out at the Iroquois.

The "Bulldog" has been completely around the borders of the United States for the first time in the history of automobiling and has "pathfinded" the Pacific highway from Tia Juana, Mexico, to Vancouver, British Columbia, and has travelled under its own power from Skagway, Alaska, over the dreaded White Pass to the headwaters of the Yukon river and been to a point thirty miles beyond sixty-two degrees north in the Arctic Circle and a thousand miles farther north than ever before made by an automobile. For this feat Dr. Percival and his companion George Brown won the valuable silver trophy offered by the Duffy Alaskan of Skagway, and in addition the Arctic Brotherhood, the famous organization of the Arctic Circle composed only of men who have "mushed" over the trail and lived north of fifty-four degrees, made both men members of the order, while Dr. Percival shares with the lord governor of Canada, Earl Grey, the honor of being a grand arctic chief of the order. The two men have crossed the continent twice and are now making their way east over the historic Oregon trail. During the late Mexican revolution the tourists were touring in the country and were attacked by bandits and were interested spectators of several battles between the federal troops and the insurgents. The United States has been traversed through its center from North Dakota to the Texas border and every state and territory except the Sandwich Islands, has been visited. After the Chicago auto show the car will proceed down the Atlantic coast to the isthmus of Panama, making a distance covered equal to twice around the world and further. The car is equipped for all sorts of weather and road conditions.
