Two Hurt in Crash On Route Four

Woman Gets Possible Skull Fracture

Mrs. Louise Russell, forty, of 5 Pangborn place, Hackensack was taken to the Holy Name Hospital Thursday night by the Teaneck Volunteer Ambulance Corps suffering from a possible fracture of the skull following an automobile accident on Route Four.

Mrs. Russell was a passenger in a car driven by Leigh H. Gill of 21 Harrison Street, Oradell which was parked on the north side of Route Four which was struck by a car driven by Francis J. Gilmore of 38 Pecker Street, Haverhill Mass. which was going west on the highway. The accident occurred about 300 feet west of the Garrison Avenue Overpass. She also was treated for laceration of the scalp and concussion by Dr. George Hoffman at the Hospital.

Gilmore was taken to the hospital in Police Car No 1. and was treated by Dr. Hoffman for lacerations of the nose, and abrasions of the knees and released.

Police who investigated the accident included Lieut. Charles Uber and Sgt. Henry Costa. Fire Department Emergency also responded.

The Silver Star for gallantry in action was awarded posthumously to Mrs. Bertha Crider of 104 Sherwood Avenue, Teaneck, mother of T/Sgt. William T. Crider, last week. Sgt. Crider was a member of the 157th Infantry 45th Division and was killed in action near Schweinhelm, Germany on May 29, 1945. The citation which accompanied the award read "After the platoon commander and all squad leaders were made casualties as a result of the enemy action, Sgt. Crider quickly organized what was left of his platoon to open a fresh attack upon the enemy. Although mortally wounded, Sgt. Crider directed the attack on the enemy tank and destroyed it."
