Dear Mr. Humphrey,

When I was out here I received the TE-HI NEWS from you. I noticed that some other fellow wrote in and asked receiving the school paper. That gave me an idea, so here is a two-page letter from Teaneck High School in the heart of the Pacific.

I don't know if you remember me or not, but I've tried to keep in your memory, and I've been about four years ago. Some of the things in the past were Mr. Evans, Mr. Cohn, Mr. Schaefer and Mr. Meyer. That year was the first time I knew. I'm sure you

When I first came on the field in August to take my A.A.F. training there were quite a few other fellows from Teaneck here. Some were George Grohe, Dave Hill, Joe Murphy, Emil Meyer, Joe Tartaglione, Jack McDaniel, and Paul Gabriel. Just a few weeks ago, then, when Cohen also came in to take his basic training, I imagine some of the other fellows will be coming in soon, too, because there are a lot of fellows arriving for basic now.

I finished my course about three months ago and am now going to A. M. school and studying to become a flight engineer or a ground mechanic. George Grohe is also going to A. M. school here and has completed his basic A. M. course and is now specializing on a certain plane. We both are going to school in the mornings from two o'clock to five a.m.

By the way, of the fellows who came down here from Teaneck with me, only one, Emil Meyer, has gone on to basic training. Joe Murphy, Dave Hill, and Jack McDaniel have gone to gunnery school. Paul Gabriel has gone to another school. Joe Tartaglione has gone to radio grammar school and Emil and I are at A. M. school.

The courses in school which turned out to be the most useful to me were physics, physical education and a general course in math. Most of us fellows didn't make cadets because the Army found some little thing wrong with our eyes. Some of the fellows couldn't brace their eyes, and if you've got it in you, it won't come out okay. It's not like a little blister now, though, and the A. M. is looking down on these pilot producers.
