

Student Council to Carry On Memorial Drive This Month

52 former Teaneck High School students have died serving their country. In their memory the Senior Student Council has undertaken the Memorial Bond drive, as their part in the 7th War Loan Drive.

Miss Florence Stein, who handles all the bond sales for the senior high, outlined the plan of the Junior High School at the Thursday, May 10, meeting, and asked the Council's reaction. The Junior High School plans to start an "Eagle" bond program, a program suggested by the state. The donors selected a branch of Service that they wanted to equip (the Navy), and with the help of a choir they determined the goal they were working for. Their goal was set at \$30,000 which would build the crews of two destroyers.

However, another plan was suggested for the Senior High and this seems to have the general approval of the Council members. By this plan, a total of five hundred dollars for each Service man who died in the service of his country from T.H.S. would be the goal of the Senior High. Since the date lists are 52 each, because the number of money raised should cover \$30,000 or an average of \$576.92 per student.

In cooperation with this plan, Miss Helen Smith and her Old Orchard Choir have planned to have various members of this group visit the individual homes of a list against the students in the neighborhood of the district of come in the future, and to introduce the new memorial plan. In furtherance of this, special addresses will be given each day of the War Loan Drive over the Public Address System after the "Star Spangled Banner" concerning the drive, and special efforts will be made to obtain some rewarding service to give pay talks. Write-ups and publicity will be handled by various people in collaboration with Te-Hi News.

Former THS Athlete Home on Furlough

Marine Corporal Henry Hedderich, THS graduate, returned home for a thirty-day furlough after two and one-half years of service. He was wounded while serving with the 1st Marine Division.

Hedderich left for service on September 11, 1942, and was sent to Parris Island, North Carolina, for his boot training. From there he was sent to Camp Elliott, California, and then overseas to New Zealand.

He was in the invasion of Guadalcanal, Bougainville, the Marshall Islands, and Iwo Jima. While in high school, Hedderich was a member of the 1941 championship football team, specializing in the pole vault. He enjoys playing and watching baseball.

His hobby is woodworking and carving. Some day he hopes to become a member of the police force.

Hedderich and "Maggie" the Cane enlisted at the same time and served throughout several campaigns together. They were both wounded on two of the same day and "Maggie" died of his wounds several days later.

Another Te-Hi graduate has distinguished himself in service. The following release was received from the European Theatre of Operations:

Donald Owen A. Krumback, a graduate of Teaneck High School, recently shared in a high commendation received by his unit for his bombing accuracy.

The 8th Transportation Center, supplying the enemy forces upon the Allied advances toward Berlin was pulverized by "super-accurate" fire on the target by the Bombers' group in which Captain Krumback is an A-26 pilot and squadron operations officer.

Participating in missions carrying him deep into Germany and nearly to the Czechoslovakian border Captain Krumback has been cited for the execution of one of the prime missions of tactical air power—the isolation of the enemy's battlefield.
