Sole Plane Survivor Reported Dead

Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Francis of 292 Hickory Street received notice from the Adjutant General's Office that their son, First Lieutenant Leo C. Francis, is officially reported dead. Lieutenant Francis was with the 95th Bomb Group of the 336th Squadron of the Eighth Air Force, and was his plane's sole casualty on his twenty-

sixth bombing mission, which was over Germany, when the nine other crew members escaped by parachute. They have since returned from prison camp, but the circumstances surrounding the loss of the pilot and plane are unknown. Lieutenant Francis has been reported missing for many months.

Lieutenant Francis took his training at various camps in Georgia, and received his wings and commission in December, 1942. He received his B-17 training at Gehrung, Florida, and Boise, Idaho, and finally terminated his training at Walla Walla, Washington. He was awarded the Air Medal and four Oak Leaf Clusters.

Lieutenant Francis was graduated from the Teaneck High School in 1940, and was married to Hilda T. Rosner of Maywood in January, 1943. Their twenty-three-month-old daughter, Leslie, is living with her mother at Mrs. Francis's parents' home. In addition to his wife and parents, he is also survived by a sister, Ceilya, and a brother, Lynn.

since in preference to Negroes; not because the Negro had been tried and found wanting, but because of misinformation.

Miss Bertha Lawrence, Vice-President, New Jersey Education Association, spoke on Post-War Education. Miss Lawrence said on August 8, the age to which we are accustomed came to a close. "If we want to be alive one hundred years from now," she continued, "we must continue the great power which has been put into our hands; which was once held by God alone."

"New education needs to spend some time on where it is going. The atom must be policed in order to keep it from destroying the world," she believed.

"Teaching must be done by great teachers. In the post-war world there must be concern for human beings," she continued. "The atomic bomb came from the class room; it came from knowledge," said Miss Lawrence. "We must be transferred from national to world citizens," she went on. "We need an international bureau of education. The world is

too small, you have to move around to feel at home in this world, get busy with training teachers by sending teachers to other countries for education, away from small localities from which they came," she advised.

"The educated man of the post-war era will be the man who co-operates with others, has self-respect, and cares what happens to others. We must build beach heads for peace, and American Democracy will endure," she concluded.
