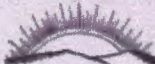

1,200 Parents Attend;

The greatest number to attend Teaneck High School "Back to School Night" turned out Monday when approximately 1,200 parents filed into the school from 7:45 until 10:45 p. m. and followed the classroom schedule of their sons and daughters.
