With six lettermen back from last year the Te-Hi Grunters are preparing for the invasion of the Nyack grapplers Friday, January 4.

For the past several weeks the boys have been practicing in earnest for the strenuous schedule which faces them. Coach Max Vorwerk and his assistant, Mr. John Gibbe, along with co-captains Dave Morrow and Frank Scarpino have been doing more than their share in teaching the new candidates the fundamentals of wrestling. The other four lettermen who are helping in this job are William Hart, Dick Child, Stan Brajer and Joe Papalardo.

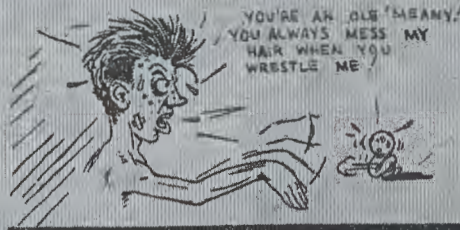
Hardwood Highlights:
