Cpl. Larry Metzler
Somewhere in England
Hi Folks,

At last I've found a few minutes to write and thank you all for sending me the ever-welcome TE-HI NEWS. Even the other fellows in my outfit find a great amount of pleasure in reading it and "riding" me about good old Teaneck.

I guess England is the same as most of us have all pictured it, almost always raining, damp and foggy. The only thing I haven't found yet is Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's Sherlock Holmes, and the ever-faithful Watson.

It is quite an old country, and as most folks know, tends to live in the past rather than in the present and future. They have quite a few old customs over here which seem odd and out of place to us fellows over here at first, but after awhile we get used to them. I was quite surprised to find that many Englishmen drink coffee, as it is a common belief that they all drink tea. Many of them do, as do many soldiers who have adopted the custom of tea drinking since arriving over here.

Haven't met anyone from Teaneck yet, but have met quite a few boys from surrounding towns, such as Bogota, Ridgefield Park, and Hackensack, but am still looking for someone from my old home town.

Right now I'm at the Odd Fellows Hall, where all the odd fellows congregate nightly. The rec hall has big paintings of Varga girls on the walls.
