Teaneck Notes Out Tenafly, 890-879

In another hair-raising rifle match in which the lead saw-sawed back and forth right up until the last shot was fired, Teaneck noted out Summit by eleven points, 890-879. The match was held June 4 at Summit.

Summit pined up a big lead of over 30 points from the off-hand position. Teaneck rallied in the prone position to gain 14 points, and going into the final even, the sitting position. The score was Summit 560, Teaneck 542.

Pohley, the first Blue and White man to shoot from the last position, came through to beat his opponent by 13 points and pull his team up to within 5 points of Summit. Then Church beat his man by 6 points and gave Teaneck a one-point lead with only three more men from each side to shoot!

Voegtlin, the next Summit man, seemingly put the match on ice by beating Carlsen, the Blue and White shooter, by 12 points, thus giving Summit an 11-point lead with only two more men to shoot.

Fitzpatrick, opposing Wall, tried hard to make up those 11 points by could gain only two, beating Wall by 81-79.

The last man for each team was up with everything depending on which of the two could beat out his opponent. It was Osthoff for Teaneck versus Whalen for Summit, and Osthoff was faced with the problem of beating Whalen by at least ten points in order to win.

But Whalen faltered badly with so much depending on his showing. He could make only 62 out of a possible 100, while Osthoff got an 82 to give Teaneck another victory by 11 points.

Juniors Have Charge of Decorations and Ushering

The first graduating class of Teaneck High School presents its commencement program.

Commencement, the last and most eventful program, will conclude a week devoted to the Seniors, tonight at eight o'clock. The Senior Class will be honored to have as its guest and principal speaker, the well known Dr. Ralph W. Sockman. Mr. Elgin and Dr. Neuman will bid farewell to the graduates. At the close of the service, Mr. Brett, president of the Board of Education, will distribute the diplomas.

Reverend Reginald Rowland, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Teaneck, officiated at the first annual Baccalaureate service which was held on Sunday evening, June 14, in the auditorium. He was chosen because he is one of the present ministers who has served in the Churches of Teaneck for a long period of time. Reverend Rowland's address was entitled, "Your Speech Is You." A forcible sentence in his speech was, "The way you pronounce your words and the manner in which you speak them tell who and what you are." The church choir offered several selections. Approximately five hundred people attended.

Class Day exercises which were open to the Junior Class and to the faculty only, took place Tuesday evening.

The Junior class has been out in complete charge of all decorations and ushering. There will be twenty-five ushers and six program boys. The members of the Junior Cabinet and several students selected by the Senior Class will act as marshals, leading the graduates down the aisles to the platform. While the procession is in progress the school orchestra will play "Pomp and Circumstance" by Elgar. Two other selections will be rendered during the program, they are, "Hungarian" Dance No. 5 by Brahms and "Bacoczy March" by Page.

Father O'Neill, priest of the Roman Catholic Church of Teaneck, was chosen to deliver the invocation.
