Hero to Be Installed
Wednesday

Initiation of a special Lt. Neal Takala class of seventy new members into the Capt. Schoonmaker Post Veterans of Foreign Wars will take place Wednesday evening, in honor of the first Teaneck boy to be killed in the war.

The ceremony will take place in the auditorium of New School Two on Forest Avenue, and will be conducted by the degree team of the Bergen Council of the V.F.W. Past State Commander Henry A. Giegold of Dumont will serve as installing officer and he will be assisted by three other commanders of Bergen County Posts, all veterans of World War II.

Many members of the class are still overseas and will be represented by a member of the family at the installation. The degree team and the officers of the local post will be in uniform. The public is invited to attend the ceremonies.

50% of Teaneck E Bond Quota in

But Total Sales Only

Frederic S. Bayles, Chairman of Teaneck's War Finance Committee announced last night that fifty per cent of Teaneck's E Bond quota has been accounted for.

Bayles urged that the people of Teaneck open their doors and their pocketbooks as a tribute to the 600 canvassers who since 1941 have given generously of their time to call on their neighbors to help put the War Loan drives over the top. While he expressed satisfaction with the result of E bond sales in the Victory Loan, Bayles pointed to the somewhat darker aspect presented by the total number of sales which thus far amount to only twenty per cent of the quota.

Though in comparison with the rest of the country Teaneck makes a better than average showing, some "Victory Volunteers" as the canvassers are called, reported that the end of the war has changed the thinking of many residents in respect to the urgency of the drives. The War Finance Committee of Teaneck is therefore making a determined effort to convince its townspeople that success in this drive is a necessity for the sake of peace and prosperity. Many men have yet to come home, others have to be cared for on the ramparts.

Authorize Plans

Resolution Passed Wednesday; Town will Renovate Building

A resolution authorizing the transfer of old School Two to the Township of Teaneck was passed unanimously by the Teaneck Board of Education Wednesday night.

Actual title to the building, according to President William Hamilton will not pass until after the council has accepted the building and passed ordinances for its rehabilitation a procedure which ought to be completed about the last of the year, '46", he said. "It will be in the nature of Christmas present to the Township from the Board."

The resolution authorizing the transfer was introduced by Commissioner Walter Guerber after previous resolutions relating to the transfer had been rescinded. Mr. Guerber prefaced his resolution by stating that he still objected to the wording of the transfer resolution but this seemed necessary by law. He also said that he was satisfied that the Town

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Half of War Fund Still Unpledged

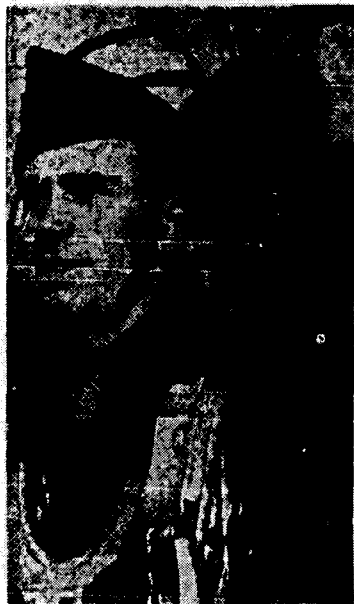
Town Districts Lag

With twenty-five missions and more than 175 bombing hours to his credit, Sgt. John W. Ranges 1265 Alicia Avenue, was honorably discharged from the Army Air Force at Tyndall Field, Florida recently.

Ranges, waist gunner on the B-17, flying fortress, "Heavenly Body", helped to bomb industrial targets in Berlin, Hamburg and Munich, aircraft factories in Regensburg, docks and ships in Bremen, tire factories in Hanover, and oil refineries in Meresburg.

"The concentrated flak guns protecting Meresburg's oil refineries gave us some of our roughest trips," said Ranges. "Our plane was riddled with more than 170 holes of all sizes. Our radio operator was wounded and an

"I phasize today," Senator Smith said, "I would vote in favor of training. However, am frank to say I am very hopeful that within the next six months or year, America's foreign policy will be so developed and our cooperation with other nations made more understanding, that it may not be necessary to have military training. However, with the present world unrest existing, I think safety to country demands that we be prepared. I appreciate that this type of answer is probably not too satisfactory, although I am trying to give forthrightly my exact views at this time." (Signed: H. Alexander)
