SCORES TOP IN TEST

Camp Lee, Va., Feb. 26--Frank W. Ellig of Teaneck, the attorney who drew 158 as his number in the fishbowl lottery more than a year ago to become a member of the first Bergen draft contingent to leave for Fort Dix on Nov. 28, 1940, has been commissioned a lieutenant in the Quartermaster Corps. He showed the highest grade involving more than 1,000 men in preliminary and final tests. Ellig is 32, lives at 288 Herrick Avenue.

It was learned here today that Arthur A. Donigian, 33, of 1069 Bromley Avenue, Teaneck, his partner in the Hackensack law firm of Ellig & Donigian, faces induction into the Army at Fort Dix Monday. Donigian has Order Number 143. Until a recent reclassification he had 1-H rating in the over-age class. Both men registered at the Teaneck Local Board.

Ellig was selected for the test as one of 131 from more than 1,000 applicants for the commission. Two selectees and two Guardsmen were named for their bars. Ellig and the other will report to the Officer Training School of the Quartermaster Corps.

Would Erect Honor Roll On Teaneck Town Hall Grounds

Lower Teaneck Civic Association Will Send Request To Council; Asks Waesche Opinion

A roll of honor containing names of all Teaneck men in service will be sought by the Lower Teaneck Civic Association, according to action last night at a meeting in Morningside Terrace firehouse.

THREE LETTERS

The Association authorized a letter to the Council asking that such a roll be erected as soon as possible in some suitable place, preferably the Town Hall grounds, and that it be maintained during the war and for a period thereafter.

The letter also suggests that a suitable plaque be set up inside Town Hall and that the names of all Teaneck men killed in this war be inscribed thereon.

A second letter to the Council will ask stringent action to rid Township streets of cars parked without lights after dark. The Association points out that this is especially important in view of possible defense needs, and notes that vigorous enforcement has been carried out in other municipalities.

Another letter to Council will request a specific opinion from Township Attorney Donald M. Waesche on suggestions from the Association on the proposed revision of the zoning code to curb more effectively violations of the provisions on one and two-family houses.

Expert Newsmen Publishing Teaneck Defense Bulletin

4-Page Tabloid Will Be Distributed To Township's 7,000 Homes—Other Defense Activities

Teaneck's Defense Council blossomed into the field of journalism today with a 4-page tabloid called "The Teaneck Defense News." The sheet will be distributed to each of Teaneck's approximately 7,000 homes under sponsorship of the Defense Council.

MAYOR AN EDITORIALIST

Council Chairman William S. Davis outlined the purposes of the tabloid as follows: "To furnish useful information, establish necessary contacts between residents, convey instructions to volunteers, and otherwise serve in an attempt to develop a singleness of purpose in defending Teaneck and helping to win the war."

Guest editorial writers included Davis, Mayor Milton G. Votce, and Township Manager Paul A. Volcker.

The Public Relations Division of the Council is in charge of the publication, which is the work of an editorial staff of veteran newspapermen who comprise the news bureau.

Martin C. Wright, journalism teacher in Teaneck High School, heads the bureau, which also includes Richard S. Dodson, executive editor of "This Week", Prince M. Carlisle, business writer of the New York Times, and J. R. Triplet, cable editor of the Associated Press.

Kasper H. Seidel, recently appointed assistant advertising director of Schenley Distillers, and two artists, William Wallace Darrow and George Wolfe, collaborated with the news bureau.

The sheet includes pictures of a recent fire bomb demonstration given by Fire Chief Francis A. Murray, and a picture of the Defense Council.

The paper will be issued from time to time as occasion warrants.

Hoch was 16 when he was graduated with honors at Teaneck. He continued in post-graduate courses until he became 17 when he would be eligible for a 4-year enlistment in the Navy. He enlisted near his birthday and was ordered for training at the Naval Training Station at Newport, R. I. He served with the destroyer U. S. S. TEANECK SAILOR LOST AT MANILA

John F. Donovan Missing, Navy Announces

John Francis Donovan, 18, of 144 North Prospect Terrace, West Englewood, is missing in the action at Manila Bay, his parents were notified today by the Navy.

Donovan, a first class seaman, left his studies at Teaneck High School 18 months ago to enlist in the Navy. He was born in New York City, and had lived with his parents and two sisters in Teaneck for the past 16 years. In High School he played the trumpet in the band.

The telegram received this morning by Mrs. Donovan was signed by Rear Admiral Randall Jacobs in Washington and noted that no report of his death has been received. The message said that the Teaneck youth might be a prisoner of war or lost somewhere in the theater of action. It may be several months, the message said, before a final report can be made.

The Teaneck youth's whereabouts have been for months a mystery to the family because of the swiftly moving action and necessary secrecy of the Navy. He was probably fighting on Corregidor, the parents speculated, when that Island fortress fell last week.

"He loved the Navy life and wanted to keep on," said his mother Mrs. Helen Donovan. "I received a letter from him just last Friday. He couldn't say much though. Just that he was well and not to worry. The letter had been written March 13."

"Before that the last we had heard from him was a cable from Manila in which he said he was well and not to worry about him," his mother added.

"The last we saw of him he was 6 feet tall and he wrote once to say he had grown even taller. He loved outdoor life and spent much of his time fishing, hunting and hiking."

The young man's father, John Donovan, is a longshoreman. His sisters are Catherine and Mary.
